The District 205 Curriculum and Instruction Department offers a comprehensive curriculum to meet students' needs and interests, with a variety of offerings in the core areas, as well as electives.

I am always focused on finding new ways and programs for our students to thrive. From our various academic programs such as International Baccalaureate (IB), AVID, and our alternative programs, my team and I are committed to the success of every District 205 student.

Just as important as our educational pursuits is the safety of our students and staff. This is why we are working towards becoming an ALICE certified district!

ALICE, which stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate, is the NUMBER ONE active shooter civilian response training for all organizations.

When we consider the randomness and unpredictability of active shooter incidents, we can approach the issue in one of two ways. We can assume it won't happen here and do nothing; or we can embrace the fact that preparedness and awareness are keys to helping protect our students, faculty, staff, visitors and ourselves should we have an active shooter situation.

During our January 28 Teacher's Institute Day, we brought our curriculum into practice by hosting an all-



staff active shooter training followed by breakout sessions where staff could ask questions and learn more. The knowledge from this training can be applied to incidents outside of the district as well.

We are grateful to our staff for participating in this training and joining in on our efforts to make District 205 the safest possible place for your child to get an education!

4.7 Million IT Upgrade

The Business Operations Department of School District 205 ensures the financial fluency and up-to-date technology for all district buildings. This year, our district will go through a complete infrastructure rebuilding with technology, as part of a 4.7 million-dollar project approved by the Board of Education.

The project, which will be financed at zero percent interest over five years, will be installed by Cisco, the worldwide leader in IT and networking. The project will be overseen by the William Everett Group, the same group that is responsible for our IT audit.

In regards to out IT audit, District 205 was successful once again. This was also the second year in a row where District 205 has received Illinois' highest financial rating.

Another thing the business department is doing with our parents and students in mind is offering free registration for District 205 students. From now until March 1, students can register for free! For those who register between March 1 and June 1, they will receive a discounted rate. Anyone who registers after June 1 will have to pay regular price.

The Business Operations Department will always work towards the betterment of our schools, to ensure that our students get the highest level of education while within our walls.

Exciting Building Renovations Now in Progress

The Operations Department of School District 205 is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the many physical buildings that make up our district. Efficient and well-planned maintenance creates an environment that is conducive to learning for our students and faculty. Our mission is to improve building infrastructure and the functionality of our buildings and grounds.

This school year, a large amount of care and attention is being directed toward the upcoming washroom renovations for Thornton and Thornridge High Schools. This project, will focus on the complete replacement and upgrade of 50 washrooms. These bathrooms will not only be practical, but will be built with the students, staff, and community in mind. The design will be ADA compliant and not only stand the test of time, but the materials have been selected to be easily cleaned and maintained. All of the renovation is set to take place during the Summer of 2019 and be available for use upon the start of the next school year.

At Thornton, new flooring and upgrades have occurred inside of the OT building. At Thornridge, new Unit Ventilators were installed to replace 6 failing units in the C-wing. At Thornwood, the South Field House has been painted to bring in needed revitalization. Throughout District 205, gym floors have been sealed, and all necessary building preventative maintenance has been done. As an attempt to reduce the use of paper throughout District 205, work orders are paperless. Faculty can request repairs, service, and alterations, by logging onto the maintenance portal provided by the administration.

We look forward to taking on new challenges in an effort to assist all students of Thornton Township High School District 205 achieve their educational goals.

We are doing some great things here at Thornridge. We are here to successfully assist our students with post-secondary education and to help them select a career of their choice. So, we anchor

everything with our students first, and that's something that our district takes very seriously.

Our four-year graduation rate has increased over the last two years and we are looking forward to seeing the numbers rise. We are also doing some wonderful things with our parent-teacher engagement.

In thinking about giving our students restorative practices to repair some of the damage that might have been done in childhood, we offer our Restorative Practice Intervention Program here at Thornridge. Since the 2018-19 school year began, we have partnered with the Cook County Southland Juvenile Justice Council, where we work with Dr. Sheniqua Jones at the SJJC. Dr. Jones is training our students, staff, and parents on restorative

As part of the Restorative Practice Program, we have created a room called the TR3R Reset Room, where the "R" stands for reset, relate and restore. We have a reset counselor and a restorative practitioner. They both work with our school's staff, dean, counselor, and teachers to make sure that our students are not receiving discipline, but restorative practices.

As part of the intervention program, we have implemented peace circles and through that initiative, we have seen some positive results. I am also proud to announce that we no longer have in-school suspension. We desire that our students remain in their class to receive as many instructional hours as possible. As a result of our intervention program, we are already seeing a shift in our school's environment.

TR's Parent Report Card Initiative

Thornwood has initiated the Parent Report Card, a program that encourages parents to become more involved in students' academic success.

Thornridge has initiated the Parent Report Card Initiative which is part of the TR Parent Advisory process. The purpose of the card is to get parents more involved in students' achievements. The more parents are involved in student's events and activities, the greater the students' achievements will become.

Throughout the year, parents are invited to attend a number of school events. When do they participate in

these events, an administrator will sign off on the parent's report card. We invite parents to attend events like Back to School Night, Parent Advisory, FACE Summit, PTA meetings, Chat & Chew, among others school activities. At the end of the year, parents with the most signatures are awarded a dinner and several thank-you prizes for their participation in academic activities. The school encourages family and parents to participate.

Scholarship funding soaring high for TR seniors

A student's four-year academic and or athletic performance(s) are critical components in getting students a full scholarship. The scholarship covers tuition, room, and board for on-campus students.

As of January 23rd, our graduating class of 2019 has earned more than \$2.6 million dollars in scholarships and grants. Our students have been admitted to top ranking schools such as Northwestern University, Loyola University, and Hampton University. Last year, the class of 2018 earned \$3.3 million dollars in scholarships and grants from August 2017 - May 2018. We expect to surpass this total by May 2019.

This year, there are several TR students receiving more than one full scholarship offer from various schools. Omotola Elujulo has received a full scholarship offers from Lewis University, McKendree University,





Roosevelt University, and Chicago State University. Evelyn Espinoza has received a full scholarship from Valparaiso University, De Paul University, and Northwestern University. Also, a full scholarship offer goes to Ms. Angel Williams, who will choose either Hampton University, Iowa State University, or University of Missouri, and last but not least Nimotalai Lawal has received a full-ride opportunity at Loyola University and

Thornton High School is off to a healthy start this school year in terms of academic and career expectations. We had a great school year last year and we are striving to exceed our many accomplishments from last year. We are a healthy school academically, socially and emotionally. We ended the district year witnessing high rates of graduation, and students' ACT scores were on the rise. The number of our students in Illinois State Scholar program increased and the number of IB diplomas were up. We started off this school year in building a well-rounded student body. We are doing some great things academically and within our extracurricular activities, we are competitive within the conference. To name a few, we have some great things going on within our marching band program, speech and drama activities, as well as our cheerleading and dance programs. As I've mentioned, we have increased in the Illinois State Scholar Program. We have been holding steady between 12 and 14 scholars over the last several years. When you consider where we are within the region, and how we compare to other high schools in our region, we are amongst the highest. We are doing great things in getting students' college and careers ready, and pushing them to transition to the next phase of their lives. In the south suburban region, we rank 51% in the FAFSA (Free Application for Student Aid) program. By far, we rank the second high school in

this region of South Cook County receiving FAFSA funding. We have developed our MTSS (Multi-Tier System) program, which is managed by a great MTSS staff here at Thornton. In the MTSS program, we address chronic truancy and mentor students, as well as address social and emotional concerns. The MTTS program offer our students the extended academic support they need. Our concerns are keeping our students on the right track and continue to find ways to assist every student who need our assistance.





Ib Program: An Educational Jewel For Thornton Students

The International Baccalaureate (IB) Program is an internationally recognized curriculum that offers 11th and 12th-grade students an opportunity to earn the IB diploma as well as earn college credit while still in high school.

Thornton has seen tremendous success for the students in the IB Program. Thornton began teaching IB in 2016 with our first IB class graduating in 2017. That group began with 21 students. The program has now grown to include 58 students. To date, 11 Thornton students have earned the prestigious IB Diploma, far surpassing other suburban IB schools in our area. Prepscholar.com, an online IB blog reported that students must score 24 points or more between all of their IB exams to get a diploma. The blog further explains that if students score 24 points or more, they will receive their diploma provided that all CAS requirements have been met. There is no "N" awarded for theory. Seventy-four percent of students enrolled in IB courses have earned college credit for their work. Sixty-seven of the students re-enrolled in IB Language and Literature have received college credit for their work. Thornton students have received over 250 college credit hours. Finally, 2 students earned a number of college credits that they began their first year of college with enough credits to nearly qualify them for sophomore status.

In addition, Thornton IB students have been accepted and received scholarships to some of the most prestigious universities in the country. These include Vanderbilt University, the University of Illinois, Standford University, Princeton University, Northwestern University, and the University of Notre Dame.

Also, Thornton IB students have made great contributions to our local as well as international communities. Thornton students have completed over 4,000 hours of community service. They have volunteered at food banks, provided essential needs baskets for the homeless and raised money to buy water purification systems for villages in Africa. IB has been a tremendous success and a game changer for Thornton students.

Both AP (Advanced Placement) and IB courses are advanced programs that run parallel in the sense that they both offer college credits to students expecting to enter college. Mr. Brad Ablin is Thornton Township High School IB Coordinator.

The Wildcat Band Played On

On The Right Track: Career Plan For Seniors

Theresa King's College and Career office at Thornton High is busy these days with graduating seniors submitting their College and Career Plan. King, who serves as a Career Counselor at Thornton makes it a top priority for graduating seniors to submit their post-high school plan. She wants students to know how to put a career plan together. She explained that it is totally up to the seniors to have a plan.

King explained that part of the career plan is that students must show proof that their FASFA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is complete and submit proof that they have applied to South Suburban College.

During graduation, one of the main goal at the College and Career office is that every senior must leave Thornton Township High with a post-high school plan. The students choose from five plans including applying to a two-year college, a four-year university. The Post-High School Plan encourages them to choose work, go to the military, or enroll in trade school.

Students receive a certificate congratulating them on their completion of their plan. The Career Plan Certificate states the following: This is the Post-High School Plan that you completed. Following through to enrollment is your choice and must be completed by you. We wish you well and hope you will use the Plan to pursue your dreams.


In case if students failed to remember their career plan, King has offered a few ways to help them keep track of their plans. They receive an email copy from the career office. A copy is emailed to their parents, teachers, their senior portfolio staff, as well as to their counselor and career office.

As an additional incentive for completing their forms, students are encouraged to participate

in the Post-High School Plan Challenge, which is a classroom effort for all seniors to submit career plan forms. When they do, the classroom is entitled to a pizza party. Graduating seniors who complete the Post-High School Plan receive a purple and yellow lanyard and a purple and white T-shirt. That reads: "Senior with a plan."


What is Outlook Academy?

Outlook Academy has a mission to help young adults complete their high school education. These students have renewed their commitment to completing their high school education - and earning their District 205 diploma. The Outlook Academy is now in its third year -- and growth has been amazing! This school year, the program has grown to a 300-student waiting list.

Outlook Academy was foreshadowed 10 years ago with District 205's Extended Summer School and 13th Graders Programs. Today, Outlook Academy has become a high-school completion program unique in the nation for its focus, methodology and effectiveness. Students are able to complete high school whether they need one class or an entire year's worth of schooling. Scheduling the right classes is never a problem for Outlook Academy students; the program offers the courses enrollees need—and only those courses. How is this possible? By assessing every single student and what they require to graduate. It's lean, efficient, and very effective.

With its recent move to the South Suburban College main campus, Outlook Academy is even more convenient to district 205 students. Students who couldn't make the trek to Chicago State University for classes can now make the short trip to SSC to finish their high school education.

And this is something Outlook Academy director Patricia Malopsy-Fortier stresses: "This is not an online



Everything in the program is designed to give the students what they need to learn. We address learning styles. We have flexible scheduling for working students and students with children. The school is open 365 days a year for students who can only come to class at night or on weekends. Classes are scheduled based on the courses the students need, so the class schedule changes every 9 weeks. No other school in the U.S. does this."

Outlook Academy boasts only veteran teachers, all of whom chose to teach in the program—it's where their

to Business and Foreign Languages. Dual credit courses are in the works, giving students both high school and college credit for those courses. And a 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant of \$5 million over 5 years has enabled the program to add after school programs, clubs, field trips, and other enrichment.


Last year was great... but next year will be even better as the program continues to grow, become stronger and especially, to graduate more students with ever-better skills.

Peace Center



It's the PEACE Center's third year! Attendance is up, grades are steady, and Restorative Justice is making change in the classroom and in students' lives.

The Peace Center's ground-breaking education style of incorporating Restorative Justice enables teachers and staff to engage students who have been cast aside, and redirects them into a path of restoration and success. From day one, as soon as they walk in the door of the school, students are welcomed and celebrated. PEACE Center is a participant in the District-wide initiative known as ACEs (Adverse Childhood Experiences) - the practice of looking at a student's experiences instead of saying "what's wrong with this kid?"

As PEACE Center administrator Tyran Cox-Bey explains, "We use haptics all day - touching, hugging - to filter how a student is doing, to sense if they are having a good day or a bad day. If a student is upset, immediately a counselor or social worker can step in and see what's going on, even before they enter the classroom, where behaviors can cause misunderstanding or disruption. Then teachers are informed so they understand what the student is dealing with."

Peace Center has implemented several important

innovations that help students adapt and learn. One of these techniques are Peace Circles. Originally a class,

it has since become incorporated into the daily routine. As Cox-Bey says, Peace Circles result in "a reduction in discipline issues in the classroom, and the teachers and the students become a community, which helps the classroom feel safe and secure."

Mindfulness classes are another innovation. Mindfulness teaches students methods of of de-stressing and calming. Students are subsequently monitored to see how often discipline issues arise, and so far the classes have been highly successful. The instructor of the classes is Dr. Uday Shinde of Governors State University, who has taken a special interest in the lives of students at Peace Center.

Another innovation to help students achieve progress—and gain rewards—is Incentive Days. When students achieve a level 5 status—that is, no discipline issues, perfect attendance, no tardies, appropriate dress, and passing in all classes—they are celebrated with a party with popcorn and cotton candy, gift cards (which are donated to the program), and certificates. Further incentives for level 5 students are dress-down days, field trips, college tours, and more.

Given the advances made by students, PEACE

Understandably, the Peace Center has received attention for it's unique approach. The PEACE Center was the recipient of a \$1,000 gift from Dr. Redd of the Carey Redd Foundation in support of the program's fundamental tenet of Restorative Justice. Dr. Redd, a Thornton Township High School graduate, visited the school November 9, 2018 to hand deliver the gift. Dr. Redd participated in a Peace Circle with students and shared personal stories of his own trials and accomplishments.

Looking forward, on Feb 13 the Restorative Justice team (headed by Aneka Ross) and a group of students will hold an open house to showcase what Restorative Justice is all about. In the morning parents will come and visit classes to see what's being taught and to experience the classroom setting. The second half of the day, the community will be invited in to see a presentation about Restorative Justice and how it helps cut off the pipeline-to-prison that often begins in the teen years and escalates to serious crime. The PEACE Center's successful program demonstrates how dealing with the small incidents early on can change the direction of a students life.
